

Companion Planting 101: Putting Plants to Work for Your Garden!

Companion planting is popular practice in organic gardening, in which specific plants are paired together because they provide mutual benefits to each other. Benefits include better growth, pollinator and beneficial insect attraction, pest repellence, and enhanced flavor of the harvest. A garden planted with these specific pairings in mind employs the basic elements of an ecosystem: species diversity, efficient use of space, and a well-balanced food web.

Here are some tips to use in your vegetable garden to give your crops a natural boost!

Tomatoes

- Basil, chives, and nodding onion (native) help to repel a number of insect pests, like aphids and whitefly.
- The flowers of **basil** and **thyme** attract pollinators, which tomato flowers need for fertilization and fruit set.
- Mountain mint (native), chives, bee balm (native), and basil improve the health and flavor of tomatoes.
- Marigolds are the companion plant workhorse, repelling nematodes, tomato worm, and slugs.
- Parsley attracts hoverflies, which find the common tomato pests to be quite tasty.

Peppers

- As with tomatoes, basil and parsley pair nicely with peppers to keep pests at bay.
- Both sweet & hot peppers need humidity & some protection from strong sun, so plant next to crops with a taller, leafy structure, like tomatoes.
- Members of the onion family, like chives and nodding onion (native), also work well with peppers.

Other Plants to Include in the Garden

- The flowers of **hyssop** attract pollinators, namely honeybees. Hyssop also provides benefits to members of the Brassica family (cabbage, kale, broccoli, cauliflower), by repelling slugs & cabbage moth caterpillars.
- **Lemon balm** is an all-around good companion plant for your vegetable and herb garden.
- **Thyme** is an excellent pest repellant and attracts pollinators to garden.
- Don't forget about the summer flowering natives, like coneflower, butterfly weed, and wild bergamot, which attract pollinators and beneficial predatory insects to the garden.

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
