# 2023 Annual Impact Report



eflecting on the past year, the indisputable highlight was the permanent protection of 24 acres of land owned by the Schuylkill Center. Thanks to an unprecedented \$3 million gift from sisters Jessica Berwind and Joanna Berwind, we placed a conservation easement on the property known as the Boy Scout Tract that will protect the land forever. We are now 365 acres of nature—the largest protected natural area in Philadelphia!

The year was also one of transition at the Center. In April, Erin Mooney assumed the role of interim executive director upon Mike Weilbacher's departure. We are grateful to Mike for his lasting contributions to the Schuylkill Center, and to Erin for her leadership that builds on six years as a member of our board of directors.

We also have a new master plan for the Schuylkill Center. Developed with Hinge Design, it reflects a long-term vision that includes renovating historic Brolo Farm to become a vibrant community gathering space, reimagining a new entrance for the Center, developing new trails throughout the property, and enhancing and defining the edge of our property.

None of these efforts—past, present or future—would be possible without support from our partners, the community and you. Thanks to grants from the Philadelphia Water Department, National Fish and Wildlife Foundation, and additional support from private donors, we are on our way to designing a solution to an erosion issue that is compromising water quality at Wind Dance Pond and downstream at Smith Run. Also, your support made it possible for



our Wildlife Clinic—the only one in Philadelphia—to provide care for 3,000 animals during 2023. A big win for local nature!

As we turn the page to 2024, we feel excited and hopeful for the opportunities before us. We wish you and your family the best of this winter season and thank you for your continued support.

### Supportive trustees, staff, members and our local community keep the Schuylkill Center going.

#### **STEWARDSHIP**

- Engaged 800 students from six schools in land stewardship activities.
- Led 10 restoration days to educate the public about caring for lands and waters.
- Implemented intensive habitat management on 22 acres of young forest.





#### **GIVING**

- Expressed appreciation for 706 volunteers who collectively contributed 8,848 hours of time.
- Accepted donations from 465 first-time givers to the Center.
- Processed **1,907 gifts** from 1,298 donors who want to support the Center's mission.





#### ART

- Hosted 800 art appreciators at 22 exhibitions, openings, workshops, walks, festivals, artist talks and tours.
- Installed 12 works of art along our trails.





- Cooled off **580 campers** with 1,230 freeze pops during nine weeks in the summer.
- Hosted 102 families interested in learning more about Nature Preschool.
- (Patiently) answered **7,678,922 questions** posed by **63** curious Nature Preschool students.



#### WILDLIFE

- Answered **4.500 hotline calls** from animal lovers in and around Philadelphia.
- Treated 3,000 animals representing 135 species.
- Fed 700 gallons of baby formula to 1,000 furry and scaly infants.
- Recycled 100 Christmas trees as shelter for wildlife patients.



#### COMMUNITY

- Welcomed 13,298 general visitors, 600 Halloween hikers and 516 Naturepalooz-ers.
- Chatted about nature with 643 friends at seven #ThursdayNightLive online gatherings.
- Engaged 150 community members in creating the Center's new master plan.
- Sold **3,772 native plants** to raise money while benefiting local pollinators.

#### Advancing Capital Projects

Thanks to the Landenberger Foundation, we made progress on building the Landenberger Pavillion and River House that will enhance our public offerings at the Center. In the coming year,

we look forward to adding solar power lighting, interpretive signage, log seating, and a stone fireplace and chimney to the space.



#### **Inspiring Environmental Art**

We hosted the LandLab artist-in-residence, Susan Hagen, who created a series of diorama-inspired outdoor sculptures capturing historical moments in bird conservation, bird science and humankind's impact on bird populations. During her residency, Hagen also interviewed birders and experts on ornithology and ecology, and worked with Schuylkill Center staff to develop a list of practical steps to improve outcomes for local birds.



## Caring for the Land

Four interns from Lankenau High School worked with the Center's

education and lands and facilities teams to learn directly in and about nature. From assisting with field trips to learning how to maintain forests, fields and trails, the students earned academic credit and gained skills key to pursuing professional opportunities in a growing green job market.

#### Saving Wildlife

Our wildlife clinic treated its first ever Long-Tailed Duck, a bird usually found in the Arctic. Unable to fly after a


traumatic collision, the duck received treatment for a neck wound. After he was successfully cared for, our staff released our guest into a local habitat where other Long-Tails have been occasionally spotted.
