



MEMORIAL TRIBUTE TO CENTER FOUNDER



Henry H. H. Meigs, one of the Center's four founders, passed away on February 21, 2005 at the age of 80. At the "Grand Opening" kickoff event for the Center's 40th anniversary, SCEE

Board Chair Harry Weiss offered a moving tribute to the man who has been our leader and compass for these 40 years. The following is excerpted from his speech:

Not one to seek the limelight, Henry, in his own quiet and confident way, did more for the Center than most people will ever know; above and beyond his family's gift of the old Meigs farm. There he always was, acting strongly and quietly to make a difference and to make the Center what it is today.

The last couple of years, several of us acted as Henry's unofficial car service to and from the Center. It was delightful duty. From experience, when you drove with Henry, you always went somewhere....even if you got nowhere.

Such was the case the last time I drove him to a meeting as we unwittingly took a tour of the hurricane and flood-ravaged roads on the way to a meeting that had been canceled. It was a three-hour drive to nowhere, with Henry navigating, all the while in his own unassuming way preparing me for the road ahead. Henry turned what should

have been a white knuckle odyssey into one of the most pleasant three hours I have ever spent. Wherever Henry is, I want him to know that he need not worry about his legacy.

When you think of Henry's qualities, one thinks of his loyalty, commitment, dedication, wisdom, and most important for a job like this, his dry wit and sense of humor. Interestingly, these are the qualities that also apply to all of our former Board Chairs, my predecessors who we pause to honor tonight. The other indisputable element of his legacy is the quality of leadership that has always existed at the Center, because it so obviously is reflective of his qualities as a man and as a leader.

How else will we remember Henry? Here's how. We will pledge to do business the same way we always have. That means that before we make major decisions, we will ask, as we have always done: What would Henry think about this? He has blessed us with a method of thinking about the future of the Center that remains forward looking, exciting and adventurous without forgetting the lessons we have learned these past 40 years.

So Henry, wherever you are, here's to you. Thank you for all you have done, and will continue to do well into the future, for the Center and for me and my successors. We will miss you!

SPRINGING INTO ACTION

As winter winds down, the Restoration Department is busy preparing for the spring and summer seasons. In January the Center received funding from The Partnership for the Delaware Estuary's "Sense of Place" Habitat Enhancement Program. This spring the money will help restore a section of the Center's forest with the help of Green Woods Charter School students. The students will be instrumental in managing this area with guidance from the Restoration Department.

We also received a \$3,000 grant from the Dolfinger-McMahon Foundation for the American Chestnut Grove planting project. This grant will help fund the continued planting of American Chestnuts, along with other valuable trees and shrubs to support habitat diversity.

Continued restoration efforts are underway in the Kentucky Warbler Habitat Enhancement Area. Additional trees, shrubs and grasses are being planted before May – the time when the Kentucky Warbler returns to southeastern Pennsylvania – in order to provide forage and shelter for this extraordinary neo-tropical bird.

Last, but certainly not least, The Schuylkill Center announces its first annual Native Plant Sale, which will be held on Saturday, April 30th and Sunday, May 1st. In partnership with Redbud Native Plant Nursery, we feel it's important for the residents of the Philadelphia area to have an opportunity to buy native Pennsylvania plants. NATURAL ARTIFICE,

A MACRO EXPLORATION OF OUR MICRO WORLD

The Schuylkill Center presents new work by Lisa Murch in her first one person art show, Natural Artifice, April 3 through June 30, 2005. The artist's reception is free and open to the public, June 3rd, 3 - 5 pm. The work in Natural Artifice combine the natural and the scientific in an imaginary world created with simple materials such as: fabric, wire, egg cartons, feathers and seed pods. The work explores the complex relationships between organisms and their environments through larger than life interpretations of the micro insect world, transforming the mundane into the extraordinary.

As you enter the gallery you will be surrounded by a larger than life artist fabricated ant

farm showcasing many different sized tunnels with small creatures posed in various tasks. A large insect hive structure will confront you on the opposing wall growing up and over the ceiling as if to encase it completely.

Continuing through the space you will encounter a wall covered with a conglomeration of hundreds of velvety mites and larger than life leaves with intricate trails chewed through their surfaces by unseen creatures.

Lisa's work is greatly influenced by her undergraduate entomology, biology and zoology studies. She received her MFA degree from Pennsylvania Academy of Fine Art and her BFA from Denison University, Granville, OH. She also studied at The Marchutz School of Painting and Drawing, Aix-en-Provence, FRANCE. She has most recently exhibited her work at Artists Space in New York City; Fleisher Art Memorial, Philadelphia, PA; Esther Klein Gallery, Philadelphia, PA; Nexus Foundation for Today's Art, Philadelphia, PA; Arcadia University Art Gallery, Glenside, PA; DaVinci Art Alliance, Philadelphia, PA, and at the Delaware Center for the Contemporary Arts, Wilmington, DE.

Lisa was one of four artists featured in, "Unearthed" a 2003 juried exhibition in collaboration with Philadelphia Sculptors. Selected as "Best in Show" by juror Warren Angle, Lisa was awarded this one person show. In support of this exhibition she received a Window of Opportunity Grant from the Leeway Foundation. GROCERY SHOPPING FOR WILDLIFE

The Clinic admits approximately 4,000 birds, reptiles and mammals every year. If you look at it as 4,000 mouths to feed, caring for these animals becomes a very different story. Each species that is admitted requires a different diet. In addition, infants require an even more specialized diet than adults. So grocery shopping is one of the Clinic's top priorities.

The diets of admitted animals become somewhat different than what they eat in the wild. Although the Clinic tries to simulate foods found in nature, sometimes ingredients have to be substituted in order to achieve the right balance of nutrients.

Some of the animals cared for by the Clinic include turtles, squirrels, opossums and raccoons. Turtles typically like tomatoes and blueberries, but they also need some moist dog food and a few mealworms for protein.

Baby squirrels require a milk mixture of Esbilac and MultiMilk® (for increased fat content) for about 6-7 weeks, and then fresh greens are added. Around this time we also offer Purina Rodent Chow® to balance out their diet. This product was used for the first time last year and helps the Clinic increase the health of releasable squirrels.

Opossums have traditionally been difficult to raise in the rehabilitation field. Last year volunteer Diane Cameron found the perfect resource to help the Clinic overcome this hurdle. The recipe came from the National Opossum Society and includes a variety of food choices that are blended and fed several times a day to infants and juveniles and then once a day to adults. The diet needs mixed vegetables, salmon, hard-boiled eggs, apple juice, cat chow and much more.

Depending on the weight of the opossum, different combinations of the diet are offered.

Raccoons are easy to appease, as they are omnivorous in the wild. However, as babies they require a different milk formula made by Fox Valley®. As they reach eight weeks they are introduced to "slop". Slop is a combination of milk formula with dog food that assists them in making the transition from formula to adult food. The best types of dog food include beef, chicken or lamb as the first ingredient because they contain protein. As the raccoons mature and get ready for release, even more protein and plant matter are incorporated into their meals.

The usual grocery list for a week is large and usually includes: 12 heads of greens, 4 pounds of clover, 2 cases of dog food, carrots, tomatoes, apples, bananas, 500 crickets, 5,000 mealworms, fruit flies, 12 packages of frozen mixed vegetables, 8 containers of fresh fruit and 8 quarts of plain yogurt for just about everybody because it is a good source of calcium and healthy bacteria.

SCEE & GWCS PARTNER-SHIP: LOOKING FORWARD

In August, 2002, the newly formed Green Woods Charter School (GWCS) found a wonderful home and educational partner in The Schuylkill Center for Environmental Education (SCEE). Green Woods is committed to projectbased learning with the environment as a key focus of the curriculum in order to "foster a keen understanding of the interrelatedness and interdependence of our global existence." Set in the midst of the Center's several hundred acres of field, forests, ponds, ravines and streams; Green Woods is ideally situated to immerse students in the study and care of the natural world. The educators of the SCEE/GWCS partnership are involved in a unique collaboration to create a K-8 curriculum that integrates the environment throughout the school experience. This means that, in addition to science, the other core disciplines of math, language arts, social studies, art and music will also integrate the natural surroundings as a context for learning. We believe that this collaboration is the first of its kind in the United States — a public school and an environmental center pooling the best of their resources to create an environmental model of learning. Directing this effort are Jean Wallace, the Curriculum Coordinator at GWCS, and Jennifer Hoffman, the Director of Education at SCEE. Both women bring years of experience as educators in the formal and non-formal sectors to the partnership.

It is the goal of the partnership that students will become deeply connected to the natural world. On one level, this means that a graduate of GWCS will have an uncommon ability to observe and appreciate the complexities of the environment. An understanding of the environment is enhanced by the two and a half hours of environmental education provided by SCEE educators in class every week.

SCEE educators are also teaching students specific skills that will serve them well as they work throughout their lives to help solve the complex environmental problems that face us in the 21st century. This "big picture" thinking is appealing to PECO Energy, an Exelon Corporation, which is helping underwrite our partnership this year. Environmental activities vary throughout the GWCS grades. For example, the first grade spends the year learning about the ecosystem in

and around Polliwog Pond. They visit the pond many times throughout the year to search for signs of the many animals and plants that depend on the pond for water, shelter, food and oxygen.

With the forest ecosystem as the context of studies, the third graders are frequently outdoors, learning about the characteristics of trees that enable them to survive in the heat and cold of the varying seasons. They are practicing their naturalist skills as they learn to identify a variety of tree species and the organisms that depend on the forest.

The fourth grade adopts Smith's Run, a tributary



of the Schuylkill River that has cut a deep ravine through the landscape. By studying this tributary, the students learn all about streams and the river on which Philadelphia depends.

As our two organizations move forward, we hope to continue the exciting partnership we have created. Providing environmental education has always been a pillar of SCEE, and our relationship with GWCS gives us one more way to disseminate positive information.
