Little dispute remains over the issue of excessive greenhouse gas emissions collecting in the atmosphere: Science has finally overwhelmed politics; statistics have trumped speculation; Polar Bears are on the endangered species list; and the responsibility to ameliorate the situation lies with all of us. This is by no means a death knell, but a call to action. Environmental issues, though seemingly gloomy and foreboding, can be resolved. We have seen that addressing the issues can improve these conditions. Some of the successes have come from The Clean Air Act, Wetlands Protection measures, many new State conservation codes, and local calls to action such as Philadelphia's "Next Great City" initiative that encourages the future mayors to become involved in neighborhood transformation. Just as we can change the political landscape with our vote, we can improve the environmental landscape with our actions.

To that end, The Schuylkill Center has made the decision to go electronic and discontinue the printing and mailing of this quarterly newsletter. This will benefit The Center, Philadelphia, the Commonwealth and the earth overall in several ways, mostly in the reduction of our carbon footprint, which is a measure of the impact human activities have on the environment in terms of the amount of green house gases produced, measured in units of carbon dioxide.

The paper industry emits the fourth highest level of CO2 among manufacturers after large scale manufacturing, electric power production, and motor vehicles. For each ton of paper that is not used and is allowed to remain in the form of trees, carbon dioxide is reduced by over three metric tons. The New York Times Sunday edition requires the pulping of 20,000 trees! Conversely, one mature tree utilizes up to one ton of CO2.

In addition to reducing our carbon footprint, there will be a monetary and labor saving gain by publishing The Quill on our website. Printing and mailing one edition of The Quill costs approximately \$1500. These savings can be reinvested in a number of ways, not the least of which is the programming and promotion of Philadelphia's environmental initiatives such as "The Next Great City" and "The Urban Sustainability Forums," and the Schuylkill Center's new 'Greening Your Home' seminar series and 'Green on Screen,' Environmental Film Nights.

So please continue to read all about us, check out the calendar and programs on our website, and join us in taking another step toward a sustainable future.

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

NEW EXHIBIT: ART IN THE ENVIRONMENT


The Schuylkill Center's outdoor **Art in the Environment** program returns this Spring with *Green Machine*, May 6th — September 2007, presented in partnership with InLiquid.com. The *Art in the Environment* program is the presentation of site specific installation produced and curated in partnership with arts organizations and groups. This year

The Center has invited InLiquid.com to curate this exhibition. InLiquid.com is a Philadelphia based nonprofit organization that shows an extensive online collection of work by local, national, and international artists while serving as a comprehensive hub for visual arts information and resources.

Green Machine will feature installations along Woodcock trail by three InLiquid artists: Chris Vecchio, Kate Murken and Keiko Miyamori. Each installation will integrate technology and traditional materials that contrasts the concrete characteristics of the built environment with the ephemeral charac-

teristics found in the natural environment such as: noise versus sound; rigid versus rugged; occurrence versus time. Chris Vecchio will incorporate sound devices activated by motion sensors; Kate Murken will install built environments that can be interacted with using the visitors' cell phone or iPod; and Keiko Miyamori presents a collaborative piece with sound performance. The opening reception will include a live improvisational performance at The Center simultaneously with a similar performance taking place in Japan using internet technology.

In addition to the outdoor installations, a "Media Lab" interactive exhibit will be presented in the Art Gallery that allows visitors to examine aspects of the outdoor art more closely. InLiquid will create an interactive, online component. A documentary on the making of *Green Machine* will be produced by Vincent Rominello

THE FIRST CASE OF THE NEW YEAR

New Year's Day is always an eventful day at The Schuylkill Center's Wildlife Rehabilitation Clinic...I'm not sure why, but history shows that something strange always seems to happen. January 1st 2007 was no exception.

While the spring and summer months are definitely the "busy season" as

far as taking care of overwhelming numbers of displaced wildlife, the winter months are full of their own challenges. The critters we treat, though fewer in number during the winter months, tend to be more "high-maintenance", with injuries resulting from car impacts, poisoning, habitat destruction, or in this case...getting trapped in a chimney.



and feathers could do. In the fireplace we saw...a beautiful, if sooty, Barred Owl!

How did the owl get there? We had no idea: Barred Owls, a cousin of the endangered Northern Spotted Owl, are very rare in Pennsylvania, let alone



in Philadelphia. We were amazed that such a creature could live and thrive within the city! A young girl in the house, being a Harry Potter fan, was delighted to see him, and was half expecting a letter from Hogwarts.
